#### INTRODUCTION AND OVERVIEW

Lawrence County Community Action Partnership's (LCCAP) purpose in conducting a Community Needs
Assessment is to examine both the strengths of the community and its areas for improvement. Through the
Community Needs Assessment, LCCAP will be able to develop a clear understanding of Lawrence County and
develop proactive plans with community partners to address any areas of concern.

The Community Needs Assessment will examine the basic composition of the County, the key partnerships and collaborations held by LCCAP, and key indicators of the area's quality of life.

The availability of assets, affordability of the indicator, and quality of each indicator will be examined. This examination will highlight the resources available to Lawrence County residents as well as clarify any areas of need that if developed could improve services and resources in the County.

### **LCCAP Mission Statement**

The partnership is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life within Lawrence County by eliminating and preventing the causes and effects of poverty by mobilizing and directing resources to assist, educate, and promote self-sufficiency.

### Role of the Community Action Agency

Community Action Agencies (CAAs) are nonprofit organizations established under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 to fight America's War on Poverty. Their mission is to help people help themselves in achieving self-sufficiency.

LCCAP is the designated community action agency of Lawrence County and is also part of a larger CAA Network: National Community Action Partnership, National Community Action Foundation, Community Action Association of Pennsylvania, and regional CAA partner collaborations.

# **LCCAP Profile**

LCCAP is comprised of three agencies: Lawrence County Social Services, Inc. (LCSS), Allied Coordinated Transportation Services, Inc. (ACTS), and United Community Services, Inc. (UCS). These three agencies are housed together, intermingling programming, leveraging funding streams, and embodied under the same fiscal management, thereby fostering efficient and effective communication across the organization.

The majority of LCCAP's programs and services are geared toward low-income individuals and families experiencing crisis and/or in need of services to overcome issues negatively impacting self-sufficiency such as employment, education, health, housing, transportation, and child care. LCCAP provides the abovementioned services to a variety of populations across the lifespan, with some programs/services geared to meet the needs of certain cohorts such as infants, toddlers, and preschoolers, at-risk youth, older youth ages 16-24, senior citizens, disabled individuals, minorities, and veterans.


LCCAP has become the regional administrator of several programs, currently encompassing 27 counties across Pennsylvania.


This community needs assessment will focus on Lawrence County only.


### **The Assessment Process**

The choices about what to assess and how to undertake the assessment process engaged all key LCCAP decision-makers and other staff who are primary users of the information and analysis, including the Board of Directors. An assessment team was established and charged with the responsibility of the compilation and analysis of the data and information.

LCCAP's Assessment Team first developed a Community Needs Assessment Survey to poll community citizens to get public insight on priorities, needs, and gaps in services within Lawrence County. A total of 278 individuals representing all ages, sectors of the community, and both urban and rural areas of the community responded. Results are as follows:










Additional information used to ascertain community needs and gaps in services:

# Education, health, nutrition and social service needs of eligible clients; prevalent social or economic factors that impact well-being

LCCAP surveys all potential clients during the intake/eligibility process, asking them to self-describe their perceived most pressing needs within the categories of services offered by the agency. The results for all intakes conducted during 2017 are as follows:

Utilizing this information, the team then developed a broad issues framework to include areas that affect individuals, families, and the communities where they live. Aligning with the National Community Action Network Theory of Change's Services and Strategies, the following domains encompass economic security, well-being of individuals and families, and community vitality: Employment; Education & Cognitive Development; Income, Infrastructure & Asset Building; Health/Social Behavioral Development; and Civic Engagement & Community Involvement.

Next, the team determined what information and data to include from internal agency surveys, assessments and reports, and from outside sources. This information and data was then shared with the Community Needs Assessment Focus Group, which consists of county residents representing various sectors of the community such as business, non-profit community-based, faith-based, and recipients of social services. This Focus Group met three times to discuss local needs and assets, review and analyze information and data, and then to review and finalize this Community Needs Assessment.

While discussing local needs and assets, the Focus Group identified and discussed the following county characteristics:




Upon much discussion and activities, the Focus Group determined that the root of many of the issues permeating the county is a hopeless mindset which leads to apathy. Many people have given up, and given-in to the surmounting negativity which comes from living in an economically depressed area of generational poverty and seemingly vanishing opportunity.


Conversely, the Focus Group believes that Lawrence County has the potential to turns things around by concentrating on and building upon all of the assets and positive attributes the county has to offer. The Focus Group strongly believes that new leadership is needed to achieve this goal.


The Focus Group will continue to meet annually to review and update this report.

Annually, and often randomly, LCCAP conducts anonymous surveys so that clientele have the opportunity to provide feedback on customer service and programming. The following are the most recent results of this survey. Of the 34 surveys conducted, there were no negative responses.









#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Every 3 years, Lawrence County Community Action Partnership completes an assessment of needs and assets for Lawrence County. Current top findings per service domain are as follows:

### **Employment**

Many jobs available within the county are in industries not providing a living wage. Therefore, many people even when employed are considered underemployed because they do not work full time hours and/or are reliant upon government subsidies to make ends meet. The median household income for Lawrence County is \$45,764, lower than both State and National averages. 58% of county workers travel less than 10 minutes to their place of employment.

# **Education & Cognitive Development**

The county's drop-out rate is lower and graduation rate is higher than both State and National averages although the attainment of post-secondary degrees and certifications are lower than both State and National averages. 55% of county adults do not have post-secondary education, which may lead to lower-paying job opportunities. Early childhood education continues to be an area of increased need in order to help low-income children ages 0-5 become Kindergarten-ready both developmentally and cognitively.

### Income, Infrastructure, & Asset Building

New Castle, PA, the main city and government seat of Lawrence County, was designated a financially distressed municipality under the PA Act 47 in 2007. Total county population steadily declines each year as both the state and national population rates increase. The poverty rate is higher than both State and National averages. Lawrence County's Blueprint Communities team, which consists of a diverse group of local leaders and stakeholders, are working diligently on community revitalization plans.

#### Housing

Housing has consistently been a top need within the county for the past decade. A significant number of households are cost-burdened, meaning that more than 30% of their household income goes to housing costs. Lawrence County's Department of Planning and Community Development developed The Housing and Implementation Plan, which was adopted in November 2018, specifically to address this issue.

#### **Health/Social Behavioral Development**

Lawrence County ranks higher than State and National averages for being at risk for many health concerns, although there are a multitude of assets within the county for residents to receive care & treatment and engage in positive social and physical activities.

### **Civic Engagement & Community Involvement**

Lawrence County has many social and human service agencies offering one or more services to support low income families with difficulties they may be facing. These services are usually maintained with assistance from outside volunteers. A plethora of other local groups organized through schools, faith-based organizations, nonprofits, and private enterprises offer programs, services and activities to build community engagement across the lifespan. In order to tackle the growing challenges of the community, youth and young adult involvement and more private business participation are needed.

#### COMMUNITY AND POPULATION PROFILE OF LAWRENCE COUNTY

Lawrence County, Pennsylvania is a relatively small county (approximately 360 square miles) that is bounded to the north by Mercer County, to the east by Butler County, to the south by Beaver County, and to the west by the State of Ohio. The County itself is subdivided into twenty-seven municipalities. The city of New Castle, situated very near the geographical center of the county, is the county seat. Lawrence County is designated a rural county, with 59% of its population living within its urban areas.

Lawrence County's proximity to major cities and transportation routes make it a crossroads to Ohio and points south, north, and east, such as Pittsburgh, Erie, and New York City, respectively, via routes I-80, I-79, and I-76 (the Pennsylvania Turnpike). Despite its prime location, Lawrence County's economy began a gradual, steady decline in the late 1970s, with losses of jobs, population, and tax base. Economic security and community well-being diminished and a majority of the public believe it has not yet been recovered.

In 2017 with an estimated 87,069 people (U.S. Census Bureau Quick Facts), Lawrence County is the 33<sup>rd</sup> most populated county of Pennsylvania amongst a total of 67 counties. Total county population steadily declines each year as both the state and national population rates increase. According to DATA USA, the median household income is \$45,764 and the median age of residents is 44.6. Average household size is 2.39 and average family size is 2.94. 92.2% of the population is White/Caucasian. Median Property Value is \$99,300 and the homeownership rate is 73.7%. The average car ownership is 2 cars per household. The unemployment rate for July 2018 was 4.9%, higher than the state unemployment rate of 4.2%.

The federal poverty rate of individuals within the county remains stagnant overall, though has increased within the urban areas over the past few decades, and is currently 14.3% which is higher than the state average of 12.9% and the national average of 14%. Lawrence County has a host of social service, human service, faith-based, community-based, and non-profit organizations assisting families through supportive services and programs to address economic insecurity (food, clothing, housing, employment, transportation, etc.), as well as other services for vulnerable populations and those in need (mental health, D&A, childcare, education, mentoring, etc.). This multitude of services and partnerships amongst these entities are a strength of the county.

Understanding both the needs and the assets of the community are imperative to the assessment process, results/outcomes, and strategic plan for progress. A comprehensive and organized assessment will derive more meaningful and effective action plans.








#### Population in Limited English Households

#### Crime

According to <a href="www.neighborhoodscout.com">www.neighborhoodscout.com</a>, the City of New Castle, the seat of Lawrence County PA, has a Crime Index of 13 (100 is the safest), which means it is safer than 13% of U.S Cities. The chance of becoming a victim of a violent crime in New Castle is 1 in 179, as compared to 1 in 316 in Pennsylvania. The chance of becoming a victim of property crime in New Castle is 1 in 33, as compared to 1 in 57 in Pennsylvania.



# **SERVICES AND STRATEGIES**

### **Employment**

According to DATA USA, the economy of Lawrence County, PA employs 39,185 people. The economy of Lawrence County, PA is specialized in <a href="Manufacturing">Manufacturing</a>; <a href="Healthcare">Healthcare</a> & Social Assistance</a>; and <a href="Transportation">Transportation</a> & Warehousing, which employ respectively 1.47; 1.26; and 1.11 times more people than what would be expected in a location of this size. The largest industries in Lawrence County, PA are <a href="Healthcare">Healthcare</a> & Social Assistance (6,801), <a href="Manufacturing">Manufacturing</a> (5,967), and <a href="Retail trade">Retail trade</a> (4,584), and the highest paying industries are <a href="Utilities">Utilities</a> (\$65,438), <a href="Mining, Quarrying, Oil, Gas Extraction">Mining, Quarrying, Oil, Gas Extraction</a> (\$45,875), and <a href="Professional, Scientific, Tech Services">Professional, Scientific, Tech Services</a> (\$41,038).

Median household income in Lawrence County, PA is \$45,764. Males in Lawrence County, PA have an average income of \$60,609, which is 1.54 times higher than the average income of females, which is \$39,341. The income inequality of Lawrence County, PA (measured using the Gini index) is 0.447, which is lower than the national average.

### **Local Employment Services and Assets**

LCCAP offers a variety of life skills, social skills, job readiness, employment & education, workforce development support programs, and general employment support and case management services for low-income, disabled, and vulnerable populations. Services include interest and aptitude assessments, intensive individualized case management and employment-focused group workshops work-based learning, job shadowing, internships, community service assignments, paid work experience, and subsidized employment opportunities.

Residents with disabilities seeking to find employment can benefit from services provided through the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation (OVR). The mission of OVR is to assist Pennsylvanians with disabilities to secure and maintain employment and independence. OVR works with participants to develop an Individualized Plan for Employment which considers different types of careers, transferable skills, chances for employment, potential earnings, family responsibilities, and required training. Other services available for participants are: diagnostic services, vocational evaluation, counseling, restoration services, training, and placement.

West Central Job Partnership (WCJP) administers the federally funded Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act's Title I Adult, Youth, and Dislocated Worker programs for residents of Lawrence and Mercer Counties. WCJP contributes to the PA CareerLink® one stop system by offering Basic Services under WIOA. Some of these Basic Services include providing Labor Market Information to groups through an orientation, going into the school districts as well to provide LMI, referring to pre-apprenticeship courses, a resume workshop, and an

Assessment and Credentialing Lab. WCJP also offers those enrolled into Adult, Youth, and/or DW programs more intensive Career Services such as Case Management, National Career Readiness Certificate, upgrading basic skills, and a staff assisted job search program that focuses on assisting individuals to gain suitable employment. Throughout their Career Services enrollment, individuals are able to participate in many other employment related programs and services that are offered at the PA CareerLink® centers by other partner agencies. WCJP also offers Training Services which include Individual Training Accounts to attend post-secondary school, On the Job Training, Paid Work Experience for Youth, and Transitional Jobs for Adults and Dislocated Workers.

As the agency overseeing the workforce development programs in Lawrence and Mercer counties it is the mission of WCJP to develop a world-class career development system which complements the Commonwealth's overall education and economic strategy and which guides federal, state and local resources in a customer focused and user friendly manner, to promote a high quality, globally competitive workforce. As job seekers needs are assessed such as child care, transportation, housing, medical, and criminal history they are referred to other community partners offering these services. The focus is to eliminate barriers to employment so that job seekers can maintain jobs that offer self/family sustaining wages.

Pathstone, a private, not-for-profit community development and human service organization, is the local project sponsor of SCSEP (Senior Community Services Employment Program). This program offers part-time employment opportunities in community service activities for low-income individuals' age 55+ who have poor employment prospects. Participants learn job skills, earn money, and help their community. The program also encourages mature workers to expand their job skills through computer training and other relevant courses. The program is intended to assist older workers by increasing opportunities for unsubsidized employment.


Lark Enterprises, Inc. is a non-profit corporation that has been providing employment related services since 1957. Lark primarily works with individuals with disabilities but also serves other populations with special employment needs. Lark's services include: <a href="Vocational Evaluation">Vocational Evaluation</a>: Lark uses a variety of assessment techniques to assist individuals in determining their skills, interests, and abilities. Results are used to assist individuals in selecting their career plan. <a href="Per-Vocational Service">Pre-Vocational Service</a>: Individuals prepare for future employment by working at one of Lark's production sites. Participants learn attitudes and the appropriate work traits necessary to secure and retain competitive employment. <a href="Transitional Work Service">Transitional Work Service</a>: Individuals transition to integrated competitive employment by performing jobs contracted by Lark at the customer's location. <a href="Training and support">Training and support</a> is provided daily by Lark. <a href="Competitive Employment">Competitive Employment</a>: Individuals, assisted by Employment Specialists, seek, obtain, and maintain jobs in the community. <a href="Services may include">Services may include</a>, but are not limited to: assistance with resumes, interviews, job training, and follow up support.







### **Pennsylvania Systems of School Assessment**

The annual Pennsylvania Systems of School Assessment is a standards-based, criterion-referenced assessment which provides students, parents, educators and citizens with an understanding of student and school performance related to the attainment of proficiency of the academic standards. These standards in English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science/Technology identify what a student should know and be able to do at varying grade levels. School districts possess the freedom to design curriculum and instruction to ensure that students meet or exceed the standards' expectations.

Every Pennsylvania student in grades 3 through 8 is assessed in English Language Arts and Math. Every Pennsylvania student in grades 4 and 8 is assessed in science.

Schools are evaluated on achievement using the PSSA, participation in those tests, and on attendance (at the elementary/middle school level) and graduation rate (at the high school level). These measurements make up a school's Adequate Yearly Progress, commonly known as AYP, as required by the federal No Child Left Behind Act. Using 2001-2002 data as the starting point, Pennsylvania initially established the following AYP targets for 2008-2010, which have since increased over time, moving towards having 100% of students in the Commonwealth proficient or above in reading and math by the year 2014:

- 63% of students proficient or above in reading
- o 56% of students proficient or above in math
- 95% student participation in the PSSA
- o 90% or improvement in attendance/80% or improvement in graduation

These expectations apply not only to the school or district as a whole, but also to the performance of subgroups, including racial/ethnic categories, low-income students, students with disabilities, and English Language Learners. The New Castle Area School District, having the highest concentration of low-income students in the county, faces particularly challenging circumstances with regard to AYP.

#### **Achievements in Math - by Group**

This indicator shows the Math proficiency results from the 2017 Pennsylvania Systems of Schools Assessment (PSSA) Academic Achievement Report for each school district in the report area, broken down by All Students and Historically Underperforming. Data for groups with 10 or fewer students were replaced by blanks and subgroups with no student assessed were removed. Percentages were rounded to the nearest tenth. 





Percent Persons Eligible





Self-sufficiency for Lawrence County is a difficult goal to achieve. A household is considered to be self-sufficient when the adult (with one child) is working 2080 hours/year at a pay rage of \$20.40/hour. That is an annual salary of \$42,432. The largest industry in Lawrence County is the Healthcare industry, employing

almost 20% of the population. The average wage for occupations in the Healthcare industry is \$33,895; placing the household approximately \$8500 short of meeting basic needs to include but not limited to: housing, food, child care, transportation, and medical.

Also, there is a gap in skilled positions and employees trained to fill those positions, thus limiting employment opportunities. As a result, many are forced to accept minimum wage (\$7.25/ hour) jobs. The same household make-up, consisting of one adult and one child, with the adult working full-time hours (2080 hours/year), will earn an annual salary of only \$15,080. That is an astounding \$27,352 deficit in being able to provide the basic necessities of life.

Those that are fortunate enough to earn a degree beyond high school are still forced to accept employment below the "living wage" level. This is because the local economy is not able to provide a reasonable return on their education because the community is so impoverished.

Generational poverty is an issue that needs to be addressed in Lawrence County. Children often model the lifestyle of their parents/guardians, thus perpetuating poverty in our community.

### **Available Assets: Home Ownership**

Pennsylvania Housing Finance Agency

PHFA offers home purchase loans with low interest rates and fees. The Keystone Home Loan has the fewest eligibility requirements and the highest income and purchase price limits. Depending on where the home is located, applicants may not even need to be a first-time homebuyer. Buyers who meet a few additional conditions may be eligible for a Keystone Home Loan PLUS, which offers the lowest interest rate available and the possibility of up to \$2,000 in closing cost assistance. Buyers under either program may be eligible for up to \$15,000 in down payment and closing cost assistance through the HOMEstead program, if they and the home they are buying meet certain conditions.

For buyers with a disability or who have a household member with a disability, PHFA offers additional opportunities. The PHFA Access Modification loan allows eligible buyers to receive a no-interest second mortgage to finance modifications to the home they are purchasing. These buyers may also qualify for a special closing cost and down payment assistance loan available only to those buyers using the Access Modification Program. For buyers who want to make access modifications but don't qualify for a PHFA home loan, they may be able to combine the Fannie Mae Community HomeChoice™ loan with PHFA Access Modification assistance.

Federal Home Loan Bank (FHLBank)

The homebuyer grant program of the FHLBank of Pittsburgh offers:

- \*First-time homebuyers may now get up to \$5,000 in cash for down payment and closing costs.
- \*New registration process makes applying easier than ever.
- \*Approvals now made in 7 business days or less.
- \*Homeownership counseling minimum requirement lowered from 8 hours to 4.

Through First Front Door, FHLBank member financial institutions, housing counseling agencies, REALTORS®, community-based organizations and others with a stake in homeownership can open the door for first-time homebuyers. This critical grant can help strong, worthy buyers achieve an American dream they may have never before thought possible.

### Habitat for Humanity

Habitat for Humanity International is a nonprofit, ecumenical Christian organization dedicated to eliminating substandard housing and homelessness worldwide and to making adequate, affordable shelter a matter of conscience and action. Habitat is founded on the conviction that every man, woman and child should have a simple, decent, affordable place to live in dignity and safety.

### **USDA** Rural Development

Rural Housing Direct Loans are loans that are directly funded by the Government. These loans are available for low- and very low-income households to obtain homeownership. Applicants may obtain 100% financing to purchase an existing dwelling, purchase a site and construct a dwelling, or purchase newly constructed dwellings located in rural areas. Mortgage payments are based on the household's adjusted income. These loans are commonly referred to as Section 502 Direct Loans. Section 502 loans are primarily used to help low-income individuals or households purchase homes in rural areas. Funds can be used to build, repair, renovate or relocate a home, or to purchase and prepare sites, including providing water and sewage facilities. Applicants for direct loans must have very low or low incomes. Very low income is defined as below 50 percent of the area median income (AMI); low income is between 50 and 80 percent of AMI; moderate income is 80 to 100 percent of AMI. Families must be without adequate housing, but be able to afford the mortgage payments, including taxes and insurance, which are typically within 22 to 26 percent of an applicant's income. However, payment subsidy is available to applicants to enhance repayment ability. Applicants must be unable to obtain credit elsewhere, yet have reasonable credit histories. Elderly and disabled persons applying for the program may have incomes up to 80 percent of area median income (AMI).

### Community Development Block Grant

Municipalities with more than 51% of households with low and moderate incomes can qualify for housing assistance programs through the Community Development Block Grant.

Rental Issues

Code Enforcement

In recent years, local code enforcement officials have found it necessary to close rental properties due to the

increasing number of violations on the properties. Although these units were of poor quality, these units were

often the only units with affordable rents to low income families. For this reason, the County Commissioners

have prioritized their Act 137 funds for affordable housing and the upgrading of the physical condition of the

available housing stock.

Brownfields

Lawrence County landlords have the opportunity to upgrade their current properties through a grant program

that provides a \$1 to \$1 match for the completion of projects. This program stabilizes the area's tax base.

### Ellwood City Hospital

The Ellwood City Hospital is located in Ellwood City Borough. Ellwood City Hospital is a 125 acute care bed facility. Ellwood City Hospital provides:

- \*Complete Diagnostic, Therapeutic and Surgical Services, including Life Flight Information on services at this hospital are subject to change in 2019.

#### Midwestern Intermediate Unit IV

Teen Parenting provides support services to pregnant and parenting teens including personal and career counseling, parenting skills, liaison with community agencies, career exploration workshops, and child care services for parenting teens. The program's focus is to help students graduate from high school, prepare for their future, and become successful parents. Over three-fourths of participants received prenatal care in the first trimester and over 99% received care by the second trimester. 98% of participants are up-to-date on recommended childhood immunizations. 6.3% of teens who gave birth in Pennsylvania delivered babies that were of low-birth weight (5lbs., 9 oz. or less). The percentage of babies born to teens in MIU IV's program was significantly lower at 4.0%.

### Primary Health Network

Primary Health Network is the region's federally qualified health center, and operates various locations in the Lawrence County are, providing comprehensive primary care and preventive care, including health, oral, and mental health/substance abuse services to persons of all ages, regardless of their ability to pay. Locally, PHN provides a complement of services including pharmacy, complementary medicine, and primary care.

Challenges: Options in Aging (Lawrence County Area Agency on Aging)

Challenges offers one-stop access to services for adults 60+. Supportive services include: care management, assistance with bathing, in-home meals, Medicate insurance counseling, and caregiver support. The Senior Community Center located in the building offers meals, recreation, and health and wellness programs for adults 50+ such as exercise sessions, fitness room, Yoga, Zumba, blood pressure screening, health-related topics, cards, knitting, and bingo.

Crisis Shelter of Lawrence County

Since 1981, the Crisis Shelter of Lawrence County has been meeting the needs of rape and domestic violence. Free services provided include emergency shelter and counseling for victims of domestic violence, emotional abuse, rape, sexual assault, and child molestation.

#### Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)

The mission of WIC is "to safeguard the health of low-income women, infants, and children up to age 5 who are at nutrition risk by providing nutritious foods to supplement diets, information on healthy eating, and referrals to health care". The WIC targets families with incomes up to 185 percent of the Federal poverty income guidelines who are nutritionally at risk including:

<sup>\*</sup>Pregnant women (through pregnancy and up to 6 weeks after birth or after pregnancy ends).

<sup>\*</sup>Breastfeeding women (up to infant's 1st birthday)

<sup>\*</sup>Non-breastfeeding postpartum women (up to 6 months after the birth of an infant or after pregnancy ends)

- \*Infants (up to 1st birthday). WIC serves 45 percent of all infants born in the United States.
- \*Children up to their 5th birthday.

The following benefits are provided to WIC participants:

- \*Supplemental nutritious foods
- \*Nutrition education and counseling at WIC clinics
- \*Screening and referrals to other health, welfare and social services

Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) helps people with little or no income buy nutritious food. Families with incomes up to 125% of poverty can qualify for assistance. Families receiving SNAP <u>can</u> use them to purchase:

- \*Any food intended for human consumption including soft drinks, candy, ice cream, coffee and spices.
- \*Seeds and plants to grow food for personal consumption by eligible households.
- \*Meals prepared and served by:
- A. an authorized meal delivery service;
- B. a communal dining facility for the elderly and/or SSI household;
- C. a group living arrangement such as:
  - 1. a rehabilitation center for drug addicts or alcoholics;
  - 2. a shelter for battered women and children;
  - 3. an authorized provider of meals for the homeless; and
  - 4. an authorized restaurant serving meals to the homeless, elderly or disabled.

## SNAP cannot be used to purchase:

- \*Alcoholic beverages, pet foods, and hot foods prepared for immediate consumption
- \*Non-food items such as paper products, soap, household supplies, medicines, and cigarettes.

Food stamp benefits may not be used to pay off a bill for food purchased on credit or to pay in advance for the receipt of foods except for purchase from a non-profit cooperative food-purchasing venture.

#### Meals on Wheels

Meals on Wheels provide home delivered meals for shut-ins and people with disabilities. Frozen meals that meet one-third RDA requirements are provided for disabled individuals or for persons recovering from an illness who are unable to prepare meals.

# **Available Assets: Transportation**

# New Castle Transit Authority

Public transportation is provided through the New Castle Area Transit Authority. The NCATA has a fleet of 29 fully accessible buses operating on 25 fixed routes serving the city of New Castle and greater Lawrence County. NCATA services are offered six days a week throughout Lawrence County and daily weekday services are offered to and from Pittsburgh. The NCATA is now serving over 1,000,000 passengers annually and has 51 employees.

### Allied Coordinated Transportation Services

Through cooperation with the PA Department of Transportation and Lawrence County Commissioners, ACTS maintains a fleet of wheelchair accessible buses that service all of Lawrence County and provide weekly service to Pittsburgh and Butler. Anyone is able to ride the ACTS Buses, and many individuals are eligible for free or reduced fares.

### The New Castle Municipal Airport

The New Castle Municipal Airport is located on 350 acres in Union Township with access from Routes 60, 224, and 422. The mission and scope of the airport is county-wide; our air transportation gateway to Lawrence County. There are 46 T-hangars, 3 conventional hangars, and tie-down areas housing more than 65 aircraft. Annual passenger load for New Castle is 30,188. 75% of general aviation flights are business or transportation related.

#### Greyhound

Greyhound, North America's largest intercity bus company, has a local bus station located on Rt. 422 at the New Castle Park-n-Ride. Greyhound provides local residents with access to long distance traveling 3,100 destinations in the United States and Canada.

### **Available Assets: Disability Services**

Lawrence County residents with disabilities (including mental health) have a variety of resources and services available to them.

#### **Human Services Center**

The Human Services Center (HSC) is the region's largest provider of outpatient mental health services offering the community, comprehensive behavioral health services. Licensed by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Department of Public Welfare, The Center provides the following array of services:

## Affordable Housing

The need for improvements to Lawrence County's affordable housing stock is based on four factors: a large percentage of low/moderate income persons, an increase in the elderly population, a high percentage of homes built prior to 1940, and a high percentage of owner-occupied homes. In order to meet the need for affordable housing in Lawrence County, concerted efforts must be made to develop new housing options as well as maintain the housing stock already available.

# **Economic Development**

Through the development of decent housing, the Lawrence County community becomes more attractive to both prospective residents and new businesses. As such, the development of housing can stimulate greater job creation and the needed economic growth to bring more of its residents out of poverty.













Housing Counselors provide guidance and advice to help families and individuals improve their housing conditions and meet the responsibility of homeownership. Topics included in Homebuyer Counseling sessions are evaluating mortgage readiness, fair housing, credit report analysis, budgeting for mortgage payments and improving money management skills. Other guidance provided is how to apply for special programs available to potential homebuyers and referrals to community services and regulatory agencies.

Borrowers with a middle credit score at or above 680 may complete the PHFA Online Homebuyer course. Borrowers with a middle credit score lower than 680 are required to complete an in-person course at a counseling agency prior to closing on their loan. These services are paid for by PHFA, with the exception of the credit report fee that may be charged by the counseling agency. Note: credit reports used for mortgage financing purposes generally return three scores; the "middle" score would be the one between the low and high scores.

Lawrence County Social Services partners with Neighborworks Western PA, located out of Pittsburgh, PA, to screen for eligible services.

Federal Home Loan Bank (FHLBank): The First Front Door (FFD) helps FHLBank Pittsburgh members open the door for first-time homebuyers. With FFD grants, they match the qualified homebuyer's contribution for down payment and closing costs 3-to-1. For every \$1 the homebuyer contributes, FHLBank will provide \$3 in in grant assistance, up to a maximum of \$6,500. Household's income must be at or below 80% of the Area Medium Income (AMI).

Habitat for Humanity: Habitat for Humanity International is a nonprofit, ecumenical Christian organization dedicated to eliminating substandard housing and homelessness worldwide and to making adequate, affordable shelter a matter of conscience and action. Habitat is founded on the conviction that every man, woman and child should have a simple, decent, affordable place to live in dignity and safety.

Homeowners' Emergency Mortgage Assistance Program (HEMAP): The Pennsylvania General Assembly enacted Act 91 in December 1983, which created HEMAP. HEMAP is a state-funded loan program that offers valuable protections for homeowners and could help you keep your home. This program assists homeowners who are suffering financial hardship and are temporarily unable to pay their mortgage due to circumstances beyond their control. PHFA (Pennsylvania Housing Finance Agency) administers HEMAP and determines which applications are eligible for HEMAP assistance. HEMAP funds loaned to prevent foreclosure are not a grant. These funds are a loan and must be repaid. Two types of assistance are available and both methods require recipients to make mandatory monthly minimum payments. The two types of assistance are continuing mortgage assistance loans and non-continuing mortgage assistance loans.

Some of the eligibility criteria for HEMAP loans (both continuing and non-continuing), you must live in the home, your mortgage cannot be more than 24 months or \$60,000 delinquent, and you must have a reasonable prospect of resuming full mortgage payments within 24 months. The monthly minimum payment by law to HEMAP must be \$25 per month per mortgage assisted.

The closest sites to Lawrence County for HEMAP assistance is Housing Opportunities of Beaver County and Shenango Valley Urban League, Inc. in Mercer County.


Reverse Mortgages: The only reverse mortgage insured by the U.S. Federal Government is called a Home Equity Conversion Mortgage (HECM), and is only available through an FHA-approved lender. The HECM is FHA's reverse mortgage program that enables you to withdraw a portion of your home's equity. The amount that will be available for withdrawal varies by borrower and depends on age of the youngest borrower or eligible non-borrowing spouse, current interest rate and if lesser of appraised value or the HECM FHA mortgage limit or the sales price. To consider if a HECM is right for you, you must meet with a HECM counselor to discuss program eligibility requirements, financial implications and alternatives to obtaining a HECM and repaying the loan.

There are borrower and property eligibility requirements that must be met. To meet the requirements, you must be 62 years of age or older, own the property outright or paid-down a considerable amount, occupy the property as your principal residence, not be delinquent on any federal debt, have financial resources to continue to make timely payment of ongoing property charges such as property taxes, insurance and Homeowner Association fees, etc. and participate in a consumer information session given by a HUD-approved HECM counselor. There are also property and financial requirements as well. The closest agency to complete these can be located by searching online for a HECM counselor or contacting (800) 569-4287. The closest agency is Advantage Credit Counseling Service in Pittsburgh, PA.

# Rent vs. Own

n 2017, 74.1% of the housing units in Lawrence County, PA were occupied by their owner. This percentage increased from the previous year's rate of 73.7%. This percentage of owner-occupation is higher than the national average of 63.6%. This chart shows the ownership percentage in Lawrence County, PA compared to its parent geographies





### **Lead Based Paint**

Lawrence County Social Services provides technical assistance to municipalities, lenders, and property owners in regard to the assessment and management of lead based paint. Services available include: risk assessments, inspections, clearance testing, and complete program/and or project design.

### In Home Services

United Community Services, Inc. provides In Home services to the elderly, disabled, and mentally handicapped residents in Lawrence County. This program is designed to make every aspect of daily life more comfortable and safe for those who need an extra hand. Services include light housekeeping, errands, laundry, and chore services as they relate to health and safety issues.

#### Weatherization

The Weatherization Assistance Program is an energy conservation program, funded by federal money and administered through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The objective is to conserve energy consumption in low income households which meet the poverty level guidelines set forth by the Department of Health and Human Services. The scope of services includes performing standard weatherization services consisting of installation of door kits, door sweeps, attic insulation, repair of broken glass in windows, primary door repair/installation, hot water tank wraps, caulking and glazing windows, and general air infiltration work.

Furnace Modification/Retrofit is performed by cleaning and tuning gas and oil furnaces to achieve maximum efficiency of the heating unit, carbon monoxide testing, safety checks and repairs.

Services are provided to homeowners and renters, as well as mobile home occupants. The Weatherization Assistance Program services Lawrence County residents who meet the income guidelines. Priority is given to elderly, age 60 and over, handicapped, and households with small children.

#### Housing Rehabilitation

The City of New Castle, Shenango Township, Union Township, and Ellwood City Borough each operates an Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation program. These programs provide low interest loans for the elimination of code deficiencies and additional enhancements to the home. Participants must meet eligibility criteria to qualify for this lottery program.

### Pennsylvania Regional Lead Hazard Control Grant

On behalf of Pennsylvania Regional areas, Lawrence County operates a Lead Hazard Control Grant that works to prevent childhood lead poisoning through remediating lead hazards in owner occupied units.

Administered by LCCAP, the \$3,200,000 in federal funds are used for the elimination and/or the control of all identified lead hazards in 210 housing units involving low to very-low income families with children less than six years of age. The targeted areas located within numerous municipalities of Pennsylvania. These targeted areas developed the PA Regional Lead Hazard Control Grant (PAR-LHCG) Consortium of over 70 working partners and their own supporting agencies and organizations.

# Housing-Cost Burden (Renters)

## National Low-Income Housing Coalition

The National Low-Income Housing Coalition works to ensure that every American is able to afford a home. The following is a summary of the National Low-Income Housing Coalition's findings regarding the affordability of rent in Lawrence County. A unit is considered affordable if it costs no more than 30% of the renter's income.

☐ In Lawrence County, the Fair Market Rent (FMR) for a two-bedroom apartment is \$727. In order to afford this level of rent and utilities, without paying more than 30% of income on housing, a household must earn \$2,476 monthly or \$29,720 annually. Assuming a 40-hour work week, 52 weeks per year, this level of income translates into a Housing Wage of \$14.15.

☐ In Lawrence County, a minimum wage worker earns an hourly wage of \$7.25. In order to afford the FMR for a two-bedroom apartment, a minimum wage earner must work 79 hours per week, 52 weeks per year. Or, a household must include 1.9 minimum wage earner(s) working 40 hours per week year-round in order to make the two bedroom FMR affordable.

☐ In Lawrence County, the estimated mean (average) wage for a renter is \$9.88 an hour. In order to afford the FMR for a two-bedroom apartment at this wage, a renter must work 58 hours per week, 52 weeks per year. Or, working 40 hours per week year-round, a household must include 1.4 worker(s) earning the mean renter wage in order to make the two-bedroom FMR affordable.

☐ Monthly Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments for an individual are \$772 in Lawrence County. If SSI represents an individual's sole source of income, \$232 in monthly rent is affordable, while the FMR for a one-bedroom is \$561.

### Rental Assistance

Households who are or at risk of becoming homeless may qualify for rental assistance via Lawrence County Social Services and/or the Department of Public Welfare. Households must be able to provide proof of their housing emergency and meet income eligibility guidelines. Families may qualify for up to \$1500 in funds to stop an eviction or secure permanent housing. Rental Assistance funds are in high demand in Lawrence County. Since July 2015, Lawrence County Social Services has served 165 households in need of rental assistance.

### Affordable Housing

The need for improvements to Lawrence County's affordable housing stock is based on four factors: a large percentage of low/moderate income persons, an increase in the elderly population, a high percentage of homes built prior to 1940, and a high percentage of owner-occupied homes. In order to meet the need for affordable housing in Lawrence County, concerted efforts must be made to develop new housing options as well as maintain the housing stock already available.

### **Economic Development**

Through the development of decent housing, the Lawrence County community becomes more attractive to

both prospective residents and new businesses. As such, the development of housing can stimulate greater job creation and the needed economic growth to bring more of its residents out of poverty.

### Elimination of Factors that Contribute to Poverty

Through the upgrade of their housing, Lawrence County residents will find themselves in an improved economic condition. For instance, through the installation of new windows and doors, residents' weather tight homes will require fewer funds to meet their utility costs. Therefore, the residents will have more expendable income to pay down debt, contribute to the local economy, and meet other household needs.

#### Tax Stabilization

Decent, affordable housing can help to bring tax stabilization to the County. By making substandard housing livable, residents will be able to purchase homes that were previously vacant. This process can help bring households back to areas that were previously undesirable and funnel valuable tax dollars back into the community.

### Lead Education and Outreach

LCCAP offers a variety of lead education and outreach services in Lawrence County, and in other communities within the Northwest Pennsylvania region.

### **Health/Social Behavioral Development**

### **Nutrition**

According to the Lawrence County Comprehensive Plan, Lawrence County has the third worst score for all 67 Pennsylvania counties for the food environment index. Per the 2015 County Health Rankings, 12% of residents had limited access to healthy foods, compared to 4% in Pennsylvania. In looking at low income areas, the most underserved locations in the County include the City of New Castle and Mahoning Township. 13% of Lawrence County residents reported food insecurity compared to 14% in Pennsylvania. There are a variety of Farmer's Markets located throughout the County. The City of New Castle offers a farmer's market on Saturdays from July through October. The Ellwood City Farmers' Market is also open on Saturdays from June through October and offers live musical performances. The New Wilmington Farmers' Market is also on Saturdays from June through October and features local produce and artisans' crafts. In addition, some local farms, such as Apple Castle, offer farmers markets year round. Lawrence County has nine grocery stores, not including convenience stores. According to The Yellowbook, Lawrence County has 182 stores to purchase grocery items. This number includes convenience stores, gas stations, fast food restaurants, and both privately owned and chain grocery stores. LCCAP has a Summer Food program that served food to 23 different locations in the summer of 2018. In total, 16,644 meals were served to an unduplicated 1,436 children.



#### Health

According to the Lawrence County Comprehensive Plan, in terms of Health Outcomes, Lawrence County ranks particularly low (59th for length of life and 63rd for quality of life). According to the rankings, Lawrence County has a higher rate of premature deaths (before age 75) and lower rates of quality of life. Residents reported a higher number of poor physical health days and overall poor or fair health than other counties in Pennsylvania. Also contributing to its low ranking is a higher percentage of babies born with a low birthweight. A few areas of concern to highlight are: Adult obesity (33% compared to 29% in Pennsylvania), Physical inactivity (27% compared to 24%), Access to exercise opportunities (77% compared to 85%), and Sexually transmitted diseases (the rate for this measure is increasing).


### Persons Receiving Medicare:

#### Prenatal Care:

Prenatal care significantly factors into the health of pregnant women and the birth of healthy babies. In 2014, the total number of women's first prenatal care visit occurring in the 1st trimester of pregnancy was 613; the total number of first visits during the 2nd trimester was 228; and, for the 3rd trimester the total was 62 first time visits. Women's first prenatal care visit in an unknown trimester totaled 36 occurrences. There were 11 cases in which no prenatal care occurred.

Most live births occurred with mothers 20-30 years of age, giving birth to 57.47 percent of all births in the report area. The second largest group is mothers 30-40 years of age, with 33.89 percent of births. Mothers over age 40 represent 1.68 percent of births. Of interest are live births by mothers under the age of 19, who gave birth to 6.95 percent of all babies in the report area. These births can work against families being self-sufficient. Teen mothers are statistically less likely to continue education through high school and college, without which many may earn only low-income wages. Teen mothers and their children face increased health risk due to lack of education and resources.



#### Outdoor Recreational Facilities: (Lawrence County Comprehensive Plan)

Per the 2015 County Health Rankings, 77% of the County population has adequate access to locations for physical activity. Locations are defined as parks (local, state and national) or recreational facilities (gyms, community centers, YMCAs, dance studios and pools). Adequate access is defined as living within a half-mile of a park or within one mile of a recreational facility in urban census tracts or three miles of a recreational facility in rural census tracts. Figure 9 depicts the half-mile service area for local parks within the County. Future efforts to develop new parks or recreation facilities should target underserved areas.

- Lawrence County is known for large, regional public recreation destinations such as McConnell's Mill State Park and multiple state game lands.
- County-owned recreation facilities include: West Park Nature Center, a 108-acre county-owned park, located in Union Township, that offers a mountain bike trail, walking trails, a 25-acre certified Audubon Society Wildlife Sanctuary, pavilions and picnic areas, restrooms and a variety of interpretive and educational areas.
- Henry Bazzichi Park, a community playground located in and maintained by Wayne Township.

- Two multi-purpose trails: Stavich Bike Trail, located in Union and Mahoning Townships and the Neshannock Rail- Trail, located in Neshannock Township (see page 82 for more information).
- Multiple boat launches along the Shenango and Beaver Rivers.
- The County partners with its municipalities to obtain grants to develop and improve local parks. Most recently, the County partnered with the City of New Castle, Union Township and the Borough of Ellwood City to prepare master site plans to design improvements for six municipal parks.
- While the County appears to be well-served in terms of parks, its comparatively low statewide ranking
  for accessible recreation facilities is likely related to indoor facilities. Major indoor recreation facilities
  within the County include: New Castle Community YMCA, located in downtown New Castle on West
  Washington Street, is home to two floors of fitness and exercise equipment, child development center,
  aquatic center, gymnasium, racquetball courts, spin center, aerobic studio, community room with Wi-Fi,
  child drop-in services and a youth center.
- YMCA Y-ZONE, located in Neshannock Township, is a sports and recreation center. Facilities include
  two basketball / volleyball courts, an indoor turf field, outdoor soccer fields, a batting cage and a fitness
  / wellness center.
- The Family Center in Ellwood City has an indoor basketball court (also used for soccer and other activities) and a weight room.
- Hess Ice Rink, owned by and located in Neshannock Township, is a single-sheet indoor rink open
  year-round and home to amateur programs as study was completed with regard to connecting the trail
  off-road from McConnell's Mill State Park in Lawrence County to Moraine State Park in Butler County,
  but due to landowner concerns, it is not a viable option at this time.
- The Stavich Bike Trail is an asphalt, ADA-compliant, designated National Recreation Trail that crosses three townships, two counties and two states from New Castle to Struthers, Ohio along the Mahoning River. The total length of the trail is 12 miles, with ten of it located in Lawrence County. The biggest needs for this trail include connecting to downtown New Castle to make it more accessible and increased signing and marketing of the trail. Long-term regional connections include Mercer County Trails Association to the north and the Ohio River Trail in Beaver County to the south. There is also an opportunity to offer a peddle-paddle as the Mahoning River water trail is developed.
- The Neshannock Trail opened in 2015 and is a 0.7-mile rail-trail located in the City of New Castle
  along Neshannock Creek. The County is working with the City of New Castle to connect the trail to the
  City's Riverwalk.
- **The Riverwalk** is a linear park along Neshannock Creek in downtown New Castle. The park hosts a variety of events and festivals. City of New Castle completed a Riverwalk Plan in 2015, which proposes routes to connect the trail to the downtown. There is potential to develop a peddle-paddle with Neshannock Creek, as the trail is extended.
- The **Park-Harbor Trail** opened in 2010 as a two-mile biking and hiking trail at West Park Nature Center in Union Township. If connected to the Stavich Bike Trail, West Park could serve as a trailhead.
- Designated on-road bikeways include the BicyclePA routes. BicyclePA Route A follows SR 488 from
  the south, through Ellwood City and Perry Township, to the north along US 19 into Mercer County.
  BicyclePA Route V follows SR 317 from the Ohio Border northwest to SR 108, through New Castle and
  Wilmington Township into Mercer County. However, local cyclists report that these are seldom used.
  There is a need to improve the shoulders along state routes to better accommodate cyclists.
- The City of New Castle has added bike lanes to the North Street Bridge as part of ongoing efforts to
  implement the Riverwalk project, which will connect the Neshannock Trail to the downtown. There is an
  opportunity for the Core Communities to establish bike plans, which would allow Penn DOT to
  incorporate as part of future maintenance work on designated routes.

#### Drug and Alcohol Consumption:

This indicator reports the percentage of adults aged 18 and older who self-report heavy alcohol consumption (defined as more than two drinks per day on average for men and one drink per day on average for women). This indicator is relevant because current behaviors are determinants of future health and this indicator may illustrate a cause of significant health issues, such as cirrhosis, cancers, and untreated mental and behavioral health needs. In addition, in 2017, 55 people died from a drug overdose.

Lawrence County has the 12<sup>th</sup> highest rate of overdose deaths per 100,000 people. Our birthing facilities reported 15 births of babies exposed to drugs and alcohol per 1,000 newborn stays.

#### **Civic Engagement & Community Involvement**

Lawrence County has many human service agencies offering one or more services to support low income families with difficulties they may be facing. These services are usually maintained with assistance from outside volunteers. The following are some examples of local programs supported with individual and group humanitarians.

**New Visions:** Imagine what could happen if everybody gave just 2 hours of their time and \$5 from their wallet each year, to make our community a better place to live?!

People get involved in their community because they are retired and have more time, are young and have a vision of changing the world, are required to fulfill community service hours, or are simply willing to stop complaining and step up to do something. Regardless of the motivation to serve one's community, the impact of just a couple hours and a small donation is rippling and amazing.

Lawrence County, especially the City of New Castle, has been plagued with a sense of loss; a loss of manufacturing, a loss of jobs, a loss of people. And this feeling has perpetuated for decades. It requires stamina, inspiration, and small successes over time to shift reality and hopeless attitudes.

New Visions is a nonprofit organization, seeking to be a catalyst in a movement for this shift. Over several years we have developed opportunities throughout the calendar year to engage folks in activities, so that they might become part of and leaders of the change they want to see. Through planting flowers and other beautification projects, to hosting a series of outdoor concerts, to coordinating the traditional holiday parade and creating a season of reasons to bring people downtown to enjoy December in downtown New Castle, we are witnessing a change in the tide.

Activities to engage volunteers have been tremendously impactful when it comes to community spirit and has certainly nurtured an improved quality of life. We continue to grow a network that sees value in helping create the community we all want to live in.

**New Life Bread Basket:** New Life Bread Basket is a ministry run food pantry providing supplemental food to many Lawrence County residents young and old. New Life Bread Basket serves approximately 1,800 individuals and families monthly thru a number of pantry programs. At any given month, 390 to 450 individuals attend the open pantry distribution day. This program is run by 40 to 60 volunteers that assist with this effort. New Life volunteers also deliver weekly store donations to various locations throughout Lawrence County including the local Salvation Army, The City Rescue Mission, and People in Need. As well, they deliver many food boxes monthly to numerous senior housing units throughout the county.

In addition to the supplemental food assistance programs, New Life Bread Basket also provides assistance to Lawrence County youth, who face food insecurities, through the weekly backpack program. Through the hard

work of approximately 60 volunteers, the backpack program serves nearly 2,070 youth across 12 Lawrence County schools each month.

Lawrence County Empty Bowls and Lawrence County Summer Food Service Program: Empty Bowls is a grassroots fundraising program across the country which helps to alleviate food insecurities. Lawrence County Empty Bowls program held their sixth annual fundraiser event on April 7, 2018. This year's team of 88 volunteers raised \$10,758 for Lawrence County's congregate and mobile sites. These funds helped to support Lawrence County Community Action Partnership's Summer Food Service Program sites assistance for 100% of the cost of paper products. In addition to the paper products, individual sites can apply for a grant to assist with the costs associated with art supplies, sports equipment, kick-off, wrap-up events, field trips, and more.

LCCAP was one of the Lawrence County Summer Foods sponsors and had 23 host and mobile sites. Host sites consisted of a diverse group of community volunteers, AmeriCorps members, local business partners, government officials, and faith-based and religious organization members. Partner agencies for Summer Foods includes Greater Pittsburgh Food Bank, 4H, Lawrence County Drug & Alcohol, the Crisis Shelter of Lawrence County, Adagio Health, and St. Bernard Parish of Pittsburgh. Each site offered at least one meal of breakfast, lunch, or snack to Lawrence County youth 18 years and younger. LCCAP Summer Foods Service Program served 16, 644 meals during the summer.

New Castle Relay for Life: Another community based fundraising event is New Castle Relay for Life. New Castle Relay for Life has been helping to raise funds for the American Cancer Society for a little over 20 years. LCCAP Relay for Life team had the honor of being a presenting sponsor of the event for the last two years. For many years, the event had been held at a local county high school. This past years' event was moved to Cascade Park in New Castle in hopes of bringing in a larger community crowd. This idea was a success with the event having a larger part of the public in attendance and greater number of survivor participants than in the past. Additionally, more monies were raised at this years' event as well.

The New Castle Relay for Life committee continue to think up outside the box activities for the day of event and to raise greater awareness of the American Cancer Society's mission and services. The committee would like to see a larger cross section of the New Castle community participate by creating fundraising teams. There is also a need for additional committee members and day of event volunteers.

**Crisis Shelter of Lawrence County:** The Crisis Shelter of Lawrence County is a local agency assisting with victims of domestic violence and victims of sexual assault. Some agency programs offered to over 2,000 clients annually include counseling support, court accompaniment, a transitional housing program, an emergency shelter, and outreach. Their agency has the support of many volunteers annually for both one time

assistance and on-going operational assistance. Besides all board members being volunteers, the Shelter has many volunteers that assist with answering phones, manning the door, mailings, and special events. The Shelter also benefits from several large local employers sending their staff to help out for special one day events as well as school youth who are actively engaged. A major factor that hinders volunteers directly serving the clients, is that volunteers are required to complete a 65 hour training prior to being able to work hands on with victims.

**City Rescue Mission**: The City Rescue Mission has a large pool of individual and group volunteers that average 450 to 500 participates annually. Their volunteers complete an application process and a background screening can be required for certain volunteer positions. Like many non-profit organizations, they could benefit from more volunteers serving with a professional skillset.

Lawrence County Habitat for Humanity: Habitat for Humanity is a Christian housing ministry organization. This program utilizes volunteer labor to build homes that are then sold at no profit and no interest to underprivileged families. Throughout any given year, Lawrence County Habitat for Humanity has 70 to 100 volunteers assist with clerical support, rehabilitation of standing property, and new construction. These volunteers consist of individuals and groups of employees from local businesses. With their assistance this year, the organization was able to complete one new construction home and are currently working on three rehabilitation projects.

**United Way of Lawrence County:** The United Way mission is to increase the organized capacity of people to care for one another. With the assistance of more than 200 volunteers from various businesses and school districts, the United Way coordinates local projects such as Cascade Park Pool Project, Women's Initiative, Day of Caring, and Annual Blanket Drive, as well as various fundraising events. Significant partner agencies include PA 2-1-1 and New Visions.

Gaps & Needs: While many local organizations success rely on continued volunteer support, some gaps for community involvement plague our county. Lawrence County could be better served if several areas where community involvement is lacking could be turned around. Two popular areas that we are lacking in include: youth and young adult involvement and more private business participation. A large majority of the local volunteers are comprised by older or retired citizens. These humanitarians have a skillset and knowledge base that is aging out. Many local organizations rely on their volunteers to be hands on in regards to clients and building upkeep. Also, if more business were able to send employees to volunteer, more community needs could be met.

#### HEAD START/EARLY HEAD START COMMUNITY NEEDS ASSESSMENT APPENDIX

Head Start and Early Head Start Programs must design a program that meets community needs, and builds on strengths and resources. To that end, a community assessment is conducted at least once every five years. These assessments must use data that describes community strengths, needs, and resources and include, at a minimum:

- ✓ The number of eligible infants, toddlers, preschool age children, and expectant mothers, including their geographic location, race, ethnicity, and languages they speak, including:
  - Children experiencing homelessness in collaboration with, to the extent possible, McKinney-Vento Local Education Agency Liaisons (42 U.S.C. 11432 (6)(A))
  - · Children in foster care
  - Children with disabilities, including types of disabilities and relevant services and resources provided to these children by community agencies
- ✓ The education, health, nutrition and social service needs of eligible children and their families, including prevalent social or economic factors that impact their well-being
- ✓ Typical work, school, and training schedules of parents with eligible children
- ✓ Other child development, child care centers, and family child care programs that serve eligible children, including home visiting, publicly funded state and local preschools, and the approximate number of eligible children served
- ✓ Resources that are available in the community to address the needs of eligible children and their families, and
- ✓ Strengths of the community.

Children ages 0-5 living in Lawrence County have been designated as being at moderate-high risk for academic failure due to a number of social and economic conditions present vs. opportunities for access to high quality early childhood and family development services (PA Office of Child Development and Early Learning Reach and Risk Report, April 2017). Overall, the information and data contained in this LCCAP Community Assessment seems to concur, based on a variety of conditions in which Lawrence County residents, both children and adults, fare poorly against comparisons, in many categories, across the Commonwealth and nation.

LCCAP offers a full complement of early childhood development programming, designed to address these concerns, including Head Start, Early Head Start-Child Care Partnership, PA Pre-K Counts and childcare services. In total, approximately 750 enrollment slots are available to young children in eight locations across the county. This affords relatively easy access to early learning programming no matter where a family might reside.


#### Child (0-4) Poverty Rate (ACS)


Historically, the 2009-2013 poverty rate for children in Lawrence County age 0-4 was 25.58%, as compared to the state average of 22.12% during the same period.

#### Children in Poverty by Race Alone, Percent: Age 0 - 4




#### **Population in Limited English Households**



#### **Children Experiencing Homelessness**

For the 2016-17 program year, there was a total unique count of 30,264 children and youth identified as experiencing homelessness and served by Pennsylvania's Education for Children and Youth Experiencing Homelessness program. The population includes children under the age of five and youth enrolled in pre-K through grade 13. The unique count shown in the table below is based on where the child or youth was identified as homeless AND attributed to the entity (shelter, early intervention, pre-K program, etc.) or LEA (school district, comprehensive technical school, or charter/cyber charter school) based on either their Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) being attributed to that LEA or where the individual was identified or enrolled the longest. The 'where identified' (duplicate) count is where the individual was identified as homeless; they may be identified in more than one LEA or entity. Children and youth identified by multiple entities are reported with their LEA(s), when applicable.

Lawrence County is located in Region 5 of PECYEH. Below is a table that shows how Lawrence County compares to the rest of Region 5's members.

The Region 5 PA Homeless Children's Initiative (housed in Midwestern Intermediate Unit IV) reports that for the 2017-18 school year, 26 children ages birth -2 and 15 children ages 3-5 were reported by LEAs to be homeless under the McKinney Vento Act. LCCAP has reason to believe that this number is grossly underreported, as our own internal data collection for 2017-18 federal Program Information Reports indicated that in Head Start and Early Head Start alone, we served 23 preschoolers and 8 infants/toddlers who were homeless, as defined by McKinney Vento.

#### **Child Welfare in Lawrence County**

Lawrence County's child welfare data for 2016 shows varied results. The following table allows for a comparison of key considerations between Lawrence County, counties of the same classification in the state, and the state as a whole. Two hundred ninety (290) children were in foster care during 2016, and 229 in 2017.

With regard to in-home child welfare services, the number of children served in Lawrence County increased between 2009-2016, ranging from a low of 201 children in 2011, to a high of 826 in 2016.

The data above clearly indicates that an extremely high percentage of children in Lawrence County are place in "out of home" foster care, and, are placed in foster care in general, as compared to similar rural-mix counties and the Commonwealth as a whole. This indicates a need for an increased number of foster homes in Lawrence County.

With regard to the two year comparison data, indicating that younger children in are placed into foster care in higher proportions as opposed to similar rural-mix counties and the Commonwealth as a whole, this may be attributed to the many social service and early childhood programs located in Lawrence County. This would naturally indicate a larger number of people classified as mandated reporters, and therefore, more reports of suspected abuse leading to foster placement.

#### Children with disabilities

Five hundred twenty-five children in Lawrence County ages 0-5 received early intervention services during 2016-17, which represents 9.5% of that age group.

Lawrence County's Department of Mental Health and Developmental Services (MH/DS) provides Early Intervention programming to children ages 0-3. Children ages 3-5 with disabilities who live in Lawrence County are served by the Midwestern Intermediate Unit (MIU) IV, which also serves Mercer and Butler counties. The prevalence of types of disabilities of children ages 3-5 within the MIU IV service area is as follows, compared to children of the same age with disabilities in the whole of Pennsylvania:

Some of the services available to children with disabilities and their families include:

<u>CONNECT Helpline</u> (1-800-692-7288). The CONNECT Helpline assists families in locating resources and providing information regarding child development for children ages birth to age 5. In addition, CONNECT can assist parents by making a direct link to their county early intervention program or local preschool early intervention program.

<u>Early Intervention Diagnostic Services</u> offers assessment (including tests, systematic observation, communication techniques) to aid in the identification of a child's strengths and needs as well as the families concerns, priorities, and resources

<u>Early Intervention Program</u> provides screening, assessment, and classes for at-risk children, ages 3-5. <u>Early Intervention Classroom Programs</u> offers a flexible program for 3-5 year olds who have been identified as having developmental delays.

Early Intervention Service Coordination (0-3) through Human Services Center

<u>Midwestern Local Interagency Coordinating Council (LICC)</u> is a group of persons interested in young children with special needs who work with state and local service agencies to ensure a family-focused system for quality Early Intervention Services.

<u>Parent to Parent of Pennsylvania</u> links parents and families of children and adults with disabilities or special needs for the purposes of support and information.


<u>Preschool Connection</u> links parents with concerns about their child's development with information, referral and service about available programs in Butler, Lawrence, and Mercer counties.

<u>Transition to Kindergarten</u> helps parents plan for their child's entrance into a regular kindergarten program in their home school district.

#### Education, Health, Nutrition and Social Service Needs of eligible children and their families

LCCAP's Assessment Team developed a Community Needs Assessment Survey to poll community citizens to get public insight on priorities, needs, and gaps in services within Lawrence County. A total of 278 individuals representing all ages, sectors of the community, and both urban and rural areas of the community responded.

The results of the portion of the survey that indicated self-described social service needs is indicated in orange in the graph below.






#### Typical Work, School and Training schedules of parents with eligible children


Children Served, Ages 0 - 2 includes children served in the following programs: Nurse Family Partnership, Parent Child Home program and Healthy Families America.

For the 2015-2016 year, the number of children ages 0-4 included in this report area totals 4,987, while those participating in an early childhood program or Head Start equaled 1,929, or 38.68%.



#### Child Care Ceiling Rates

The table below is a listing of the daily Maximum Child Care Allowances (MCCA) determined by the Department of Public Welfare (DPW), effective January 1 2013. This is the maximum base amount paid by Child Care Information Services (CCIS) agencies for child care assistance for eligible families enrolled in the CCIS program. The family pays a co-pay which is subtracted from the amount paid to the provider by the CCIS office. DPW does periodic provider rate assessments and determines the MCCA amounts by utilizing the 75 percentile of actual child care provider costs in the county by type and age range. The rates listed below provide an estimated average daily rate by Provider Type and the Child's Age Range for Full Time Care.





How did you learn about the ACTS Bus Service?






Overall, how would you rate your experience with ACTS?






How do you rate your experience in scheduling trips?
